

Fr. Tom's Corner

GREAT LENT: A TIME FOR REFLECTION, RESPONSBILITY AND SPIRITUAL GROWTH



Most parents realize that keeping our babies healthy requires taking them to the pediatrician for their "well baby" check-ups. At each visit the doctor weighs and measures our kids to make sure they are growing at a healthy rate, checking eyesight and hearing, and answering any questions about behavior and health issues.

As parents, we can't wait for our children to reach important milestones – the first pounds gained, sitting up straight, rolling over, crawling, walking and eating solid food. Indeed, any parent would be devastated if the doctor diagnosed their child with "Failure to thrive." Failure to thrive is a term used to describe a child whose growth falls below the expected norm.

So often, as we grow up into adulthood, we avoid going to the doctor, we avoid looking at our mental, physical and spiritual health. Is this because we recognize that we are already falling into the category of "Failing to grow and thrive?" Or, are we actively pursuing "solid food" growing into maturity as Christian men and women? If so, we are in the process of transformation! If we receive the diagnosis "failure to thrive" then in fact, we are dying and in need of help and intervention.

During Great Lent, we have a tremendous opportunity to nurture our spiritual health – to grow, to develop, to change! But this change requires effort, discipline, concentration and application. We do not automatically receive Christian maturity if we go to church a few times a month, do our cross and leave it at that. It is unreasonable to expect spiritual growth to require no effort. St. Paul's comparison of our spiritual development to the rigorous training of an athlete applies as well to our spiritual discipline. We are called to fast! We are encouraged to pray! We are commanded to forgive! Our mindset should be to extend compassion and love to others! As parents, are we willing to do everything possible to encourage our children's spiritual growth?

Each of us must take personal responsibility for our own spiritual health and direction our family is heading. Christ our Lord wants to run towards us like the father of the prodigal son. He stands at the door, waiting for our knock! He is ready to fill our hearts with His love and forgiveness. We, like the prodigal, must recognize our state, our sin, our failure to thrive – and make every effort to return to Him!

Returning to Jesus requires self-reflection with no excuses. We must rid ourselves of "if only... it's because... I'm too busy... I wish this or that was different..." It is time for each of us to take responsibility. No more excuses! We should strive to thrive doing our best to live our spiritual life to the best of our ability. Nothing is more important than the pursuit of a spiritual life and being united with Jesus.

St John of Kronstadt says: "Watch your heart throughout your life; examine it, listen to it, and see what prevents it from uniting itself with the Lord. Let this be your supreme and constant study, and with God's help you will easily observe what estranges you to Him, and what draws you to Him and unites you to Him. It is the evil spirit more than anything else that stands between our hearts and God; he estranges us from God by the several vices, or by the desires of the flesh, and by worldly pride. So examine yourself more often. See where the eyes of your heart are looking....

Being an Orthodox Christian is more than a one day celebration were we can produce a baptismal certificate. We are called to be mindful of God and be watchful of our heart seeking to do whatever it takes to be united with the love of God. We are created to have inner peace and freedom, to have a new sense of direction and purpose in our lives. We are created to experience the power, joy and love of Jesus Christ as he resurrects us from dead hope, dead dreams, dead lives, from the deadness of sin to a new life, a life of glory and peace and hope and joy in the Lord.

At Holy Apostles, we are blessed to have a community committed to growing in Christ, to examining and listening to what unites us with Jesus. You are not alone. We are a church that desires maturity, desires faith, desires love. We are a body seeking to live a transfigured life in Christ. As your priest, I am committed to helping you along this process towards running the race and growing in your relationship with God during Great Lent.





LENTEN WISDOM FROM THE FATHERS

"Let not the mouth only fast, but also the eye, and ear, and the feet, and the hands, and all the members of our bodies. Let the hands fast, by being pure from greed. Let the feet fast, by running away from unlawful spectacles. Let the eyes fast, being taught never to fix themselves rudely upon handsome countenances, or to busy themselves with strange beauties. For looking is the food of the eyes, but if this be such as is unlawful or forbidden, it mars the fast; and upsets the whole safety of the soul; but if it be lawful and safe, it adorns fasting."

"For it would be among things the most absurd to abstain from lawful food because of the fast, but with the eyes to touch even what is forbidden. Let the ear fast also. The fasting of the ear consists in refusing to receive evil speakings and lies. Beware of limiting the good of fasting to mere abstinence from meats. Real fasting is alienation from evil. 'Loose the bands of wickedness.' Forgive your neighbour the mischief he has done you and forgive him his trespasses against you." St. John Chrysostom

"We love because God first loved us. We forgive because God first forgave us. It is part and parcel of what it means to be human to forgive and love. What did Jesus say, "There must be no limit to your goodness since the heavenly Father's goodness knows no bounds." What makes this possible is that we are made in God's image and called to develop His likeness. There are no limits for God or us."

"Everything and everyone resides in the ocean of God's grace. His tender loving care surrounds us. "In Him," says St. Paul, "we live and move and have our being." Forgiveness is the very air we breathe. Why do so many of us hold our breath? We struggle and fight when what we need to do is let go and breathe deeply. We need to stop defending ourselves against God's grace." St. Basil the Great

Our computers have spam filters. I believe many of us have "forgiveness filters." We need to turn them off! One way is to begin consciously to nurture a life of forgiveness because forgiveness is not so much a tool we can use as much as it is a way of life!

Reflections on Holy Week and Pascha

Lazarus Saturday, Orthros ~ 8:00 & Divine Liturgy ~ 9:00 am

Great lent officially ends on Lazarus Saturday. The Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom is celebrated to commemorate the raising of Lazarus. Notice that Fr. Tom is wearing white/gold vestments. This change in color denotes the resurrectional nature of this service as a prelude to Holy Week. The beautiful baptismal hymn "As many as have been baptized into Christ" is sung. Historically this was a baptismal liturgy.

Palm Sunday,



Orthros, 8:00 am & Divine Liturgy, 9:00 am

The hymn of Palm Sunday proclaims the children holding the emblems of victory singing, "Hosanna blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord." We experience Christ's triumphal entrance into Jerusalem and we hold palms as symbols of Christ's ability to overcome death by raising Lazarus. We will receive our palms at the beginning of the Divine Liturgy to remember this great triumph throughout our sacred

worship.

Holy Sunday, Monday & Tuesday Bridegroom Service ~ 7 pm

The Bridegroom Services instruct us in our faith, as does all the preparation for Holy Week. Even more, they help us make Holy Week more than simply a ritual that tells a story. The Bridegroom Services help us

enter into the story, the life of Jesus Christ, and live it.

Tuesday's Bridegroom Service with the procession and singing the hymn of St. Cassiani describes the life and conversion of the sinful woman who anointed



Christ. The scriptures tell us that the whole room was filled with the scent of myrrh. Once again it is important to understand that this is simply not a play being reenacted, but rather we are attempting to enter the life of Christ.

Holy Wednesday Holy Unction Service 6:30 pm

We prepare for this service by prayer and fasting from noon until after receiving the Sacrament of Holy Unction.

The Church is called the Body of Christ. We are members of the Body through our Baptism, Chrismation, Confession, and Holy Communion. As the sinful woman anointed Christ, we are also anointed with the oil of healing, so we can go with Christ to the Cross, suffer, die, and be resurrected with Him. At the conclusion of the service, the faithful are anointed with the sacrament of Holy Unction. The priest anoints each of the faithful with the oil of healing on various parts of the body: fore-

head, eyes, ears, mouth, palms and the back of each hand. These areas are associated with the senses of smell, hearing, taste and touch.

The biblical basis for the Sacrament is found in James 5:14-16: Is any among you sick, let him call for the presbyters of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord; and the prayer of faith will save the sick man, and the Lord will raise him up; and if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven. Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed.

Holy Thursday Morning - 7:30 am

Vesperal Liturgy of St. Basil - This service relives the Lord's Supper and betrayal by Judas. The hymn "Of Your Mystical Supper, O Son of God" is sung throughout the service. Traditionally, Orthodox Christians throughout the world make every attempt to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion on Holy Thursday. We have received the Sacraments of Holy Unction and Confession, and now Holy Communion, on this journey towards the Resurrection of Christ.

The "Washing of the Feet" Service will immediately follow the Divine Liturgy. Here, our priest will participate in a dramatic re-enactment of Christ's washing the feet of his disciples. This act is a mystery of humility and love.

Holy Thursday Evening ~ 6:30 pm Passion Gospel Service

This is one of the most important and solemn Holy Week services. It is a remembrance and an entrance into the suffering and death of Christ. The priest, standing in the center of the church surrounded by twelve candles, reads the words of the apostles who witnessed the events. As each Gospel is read one candle is lit. During the fifth reading, the priest processes with the Cross carried on his shoulder as he chants, "He who hung the earth upon the waters is now being hung on the cross."

As Simon carried the cross for Christ during his walk to the crucifixion, the priest now carries the cross. In doing so here presents the entire congregation.

At the point of the sixth Gospel when "He yielded up the spirit" is read, the priest places a wreath of flowers over the cross." (This is the moment in the scripture reading when Christ our Lord took his final breath).

Holy Friday Morning ~ The Royal Hours 9:00 am

Following the crucifixion, the myrrh bearing women prepared the tomb and Christ for burial. The faithful of our parish decorate the tomb of Christ with flowers. 11:00 am.


Holy Friday Afternoon Procession \sim Taking Down of Christ \sim "Apokathelosis" 3:00 pm

Procession with the Burial Shroud - At this service the icon of Christ is removed from the Cross as the priest reads, "And taking Him down they wrapped Him in a linen shroud." The tomb (Kouvouklion) stands empty in the center of the church. The shroud is carried by four people over the head of the priest who is carrying the gospel as the choir sings the "Hymn of Noble Joseph." The procession ends as the shroud is

Holy Friday Evening ~ The Lamentations 7 pm

The Lamentations, as the name suggests, is a mournful service lamenting the death of Christ. The beautiful Lamentations and refrains are sung by the congregation, "O Life, how can You die?" During the singing of the Ninth ode of the Canon, the priest blesses the congregation with rose water as rose pedals are scattered around the church.

During the service, the shroud is removed from the tomb, along with the priest; the congregation makes a procession around the entire exterior of the church. They return to the church to hear the reading Ezekiel about the valley of the dry bones. The service ends with the veneration of the shroud and the distribution of flowers.



Holy Saturday Morning ~ 9:00 am Liturgy

This beautiful service celebrates Christ's decent into hell to free Adam and Eve and all who lived and died in anticipation of the coming of Christ. The glorious hymn from the Liturgy of St. James is sung, "Let all mortal flesh be silent."

Holy Saturday Evening ~ Resurrection service of Holy Pascha, 11:30 pm

As a community of faith, we have experienced great spiritual renewal in our journey through Lent and Holy Week. All the preparations have been for this night. The church is ready and the faithful have spent the day in strict fast. There is a sense of anticipation in the air. The church is darkened and the music selections are somber as during all of lent. All lights in the church are extinguished and there is total darkness. At midnight, the flame from a single candle appears at the altar. The priest comes forth singing "Come Receive the Light" -- holding the light of Christ that he gives to the rest of the faithful. The entire congregation in procession walks towards the doors of the church.

Upon finishing the procession around the church, the congregation gathers at the closed front doors of the church. The Priest knocks on the doors three times saying: Lift up your heads, O ye gates; and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in. And a voice asks: Who is this King of Glory? The priest answers: The Lord strong and mighty, the Lord mighty in battle. The priest then knocks again saying: Lift up your heads, O ye gates; even lift them up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in. And again the voice asks: Who is this King of Glory? The priest then replies: The Lord of hosts, he is the King of Glory. The doors are swung open and the priest reenters followed by the congregation.

The entire tone of the service is changed. The dim interior of the church is gone. The dark vestments and candle holders are also gone. The tomb and somber music are also gone. The church is as bright as possible. The vestments are bright and the singing joyous. It is the triumphal resurrection of Christ saving us from death and granting us resurrection. "Christ is Risen!" The Hymn "Christ is Risen from the Dead" is sung repeatedly with joy and power. The Cry of "Christ is Risen" and the response "Truly, He is risen." fills the air. This is proclaimed in many different languages.

English - Christ is Risen! / Truly He is Risen! Greek - Christos Anesti! / Aleithos Anesti! Slavonic - Christos Voskrese! / Voistinu Voskrese! Arabic - Al-Masih-Qam! / Hakkan Qam!

The Symbolic Red Eggs

At the conclusion of the service, everyone receives a red egg. Eggs are a symbol of rebirth and new life. The red eggs of Pascha are a reminder of the blood of the risen Lord. At the end of our Resurrection Service, red eggs are blessed by the priest and distributed to all. Before eating the eggs, people tap their eggs against one another's as they say "Christ is Risen! Truly He is Risen!" Cracking the egg represents breaking the seal of Christ's tomb. We are reminded of new life, or that the cracking of eggs symbolizes the shattering of Hades



by the victorious Christ. According to custom, the person who cracks the other's egg first will have the blessing.

St. Mary Magdalene, who is often depicted in icons holding a red egg, may have been aware that the Romans would know the meaning of the egg as something that brings forth life from a sealed chamber.

After Christ was crucified and rose up to Heaven, Mary Magdalene was in Rome. When she met with the Roman Emperor Tiberius, she gave him a red colored egg and announced "Christ is Risen!" At the conclusion, all are invited to break the fast and break bread together.

The Agape Service, 1:00 pm

At 1:00 Sunday afternoon following Paschal Liturgy, the Agape Vespers service is celebrated. The congregation gathers together to hear readings from the four Gospels in many different languages proclaiming that Christ is Risen!

Community Pascha Celebration

Let us celebrate the Feast of Feasts together! We will be celebrating Pascha with an afternoon of activities immediately following the AGAPE Service. We will have an Easter egg hunt, games and activities for our children and wonderful fellowship with dancing and food. Plan to attend!
